Due to the continuing rise in building costs we increased the coverage on the church building from \$1,750,000 to \$2,350,000. Benevolence Spotlight: Reconciling Works

The newest Benevolence to which we at Christ Lutheran Church donate is Reconciling Works, the independent Lutheran organization that provides outreach, education, and support for Lutheran congregations who support inclusivity and reconciliation for and with people who have been traditionally marginalized because they are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex or asexual/aromantic (LGBTQIA+); along with those who are excluded because of their race, disability, or other factors. In 2019, CLC developed its own welcome statement and was recognized as Reconciling in Christ congregation. To see the congregation's statement, <u>click here</u>.

In this relationship with ours and other committed congregations, Reconciling Works "shares Christ's message, the Gospel, which is for everyone equally." They "advocate for systemic change in policy and practice in church and society, working to alleviate not only the painful symptoms of oppression but also to eliminate its root causes." Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Sunday happens every year the last Sunday in January, and this year the theme is Made in God's Image: God's Boundless Diversity. Regeneration: Ending the climate crisis in one generation

Regeneration is the title of Buddhist scholar Paul Hawken's latest book. In our fractured society, this book brings a message of hope. The author has brought together best practices from across the globe that allow every reader to find one or more places or practices where they can take action to help mitigate the climate crisis. Chapters, by various co-authors, cover everything from electric vehicles to food safety, mangroves and coral reefs to the war in-

dustry. The broad range of topics reminds us that the climate crisis is NOT about the weather but rather about our lifestyle, our over-consumption of the planet's resources, causing depletion and death of natural systems and social systems. That is why Hawken claims there is a place for everyone in bringing about the regeneration of these systems.

Hawken offers us a new approach that pieces together scholarship and action; policy and transformational justice. The authors of this book are asking us to read their material and to then join them in an ongoing dialogue through a streaming video series, curriculum, podcasts, teaching videos, and climate action software. A few of us in the Earth-Justice Advocates Committee here at Christ Lutheran have been viewing some of the films in advance, and we will be rolling



out a proposal during 2022 for members of the congregation who would like to take a deeper dive into the Regeneration material. Our committee is buying a copy of the book for our mini-library, located in the narthex, and it will be on the shelf by the first week of January. Please contact Jeanne Haseley, Carol Kuhre, Sue Righi, or Ann Sparks for more information as they are viewing the materials as they are released. Remember during this Advent season that there is Hope in our midst. Some of that hope comes from the Buddhist scholar, Paul Hawken. Thanks be to God.

Social Ministry - Cont'd

Advocacy Corner: What does plastic have to do with crackers? And how do we give them up?

A **cracker plant** is an industrial facility that uses heat and chemical processes to "crack" or break down ethane to produce ethylene, a component of plastics and other products such as textiles, paint, household cleaners and more. The PTTGCA plant in Dilley Bottom, Belmont County, is permitted and plans to use locally produced natural gas to fuel six furnaces. Ethane is one of the abundant "wet gas" components of the local natural gas stream drawn from the Utica and Marcellus shales. So far, the company is still in the phase of buying land and destroying the homes and vegetation on it to prepare for construction. It continues to look for a partner for the project.

Plastics production is of concern because it would lock in continuing extraction and use of fossil fuels and plastics cause significant health and environmental problems. **Concerned Ohio River Residents** <u>https://</u>

<u>www.concernedohioriverresidents.org</u> is a group fighting to stop this project. They say both short- and long-term risks outweigh potential benefits to the local communities and there is nothing but risk for our warming planet. The project is becoming less economically viable as time passes. These are their targets.

- Environmental concerns are curtailing demand for petrochemical products.
- Under pressure, major petrochemical producers have pledged to reduce carbon emissions, shifting cost assumptions.
- The Appalachian feedstock pool is limited.
- Market shifts in China and across Asia will undercut U.S. cost margins.



Bullet #1 is the target of a successful Athens group **Athens ReThinks Plastics**, which has garnered praise for their work distributing over 800 bags made from recycled feed bags, educating the public through presentations and social media, and maybe most importantly, being an inspiration that change can and does happen!

What can I do?

- Tell President Biden to take executive action to reduce plastics use <u>https://www.plasticfreepresident.org/</u>

The Bridge

Enjoy this reflection written on Galatians 3:28 by Catie Perez-Strohmeyer, a freshman Bridge Student. Catie is pictured at left.

There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

The Christmas season claims some of the catchiest, most recognizable, and beautiful music, enjoyed by millions around the world. Whether it's Mariah Carey or Tchaikovsky, these tunes keep us rockin around the Christmas tree for the entire month of December. However, when I read Paul's words to the people of Galatia, I am reminded of one iconic lyric: "Joy to the world, the Lord is come." While "the world" is constantly embroiled in conflict of every flavor, from territorial disputes to economic crises, Paul's words to the Galatians remind us that Christ did not come to save only a specific 'type.' Part of Christ's work on Earth was to unify those who he came in contact with. He

broke bread with men and women, rich and poor, sinners and saints alike. Christ did not come to bring joy just to one demographic - he came to save the entire world. God sent His son to the world in the most relatable way possible: as a helpless infant. Every single person alive today, regardless of age, class, ability, race, or orientation entered the universe in the same manner that Jesus did. We cried the same cries as Christ at our birth and gazed at every-thing with wonder and amusement, just as God did. As we prepare for Christ's arrival during this Advent season, I encourage us all to practice the important exercise of viewing everyone through these beginnings, keeping in mind that Christ came to save all of us - that we all share the same immense love of God from the time we take our first breath, to the time we exhale our last.
