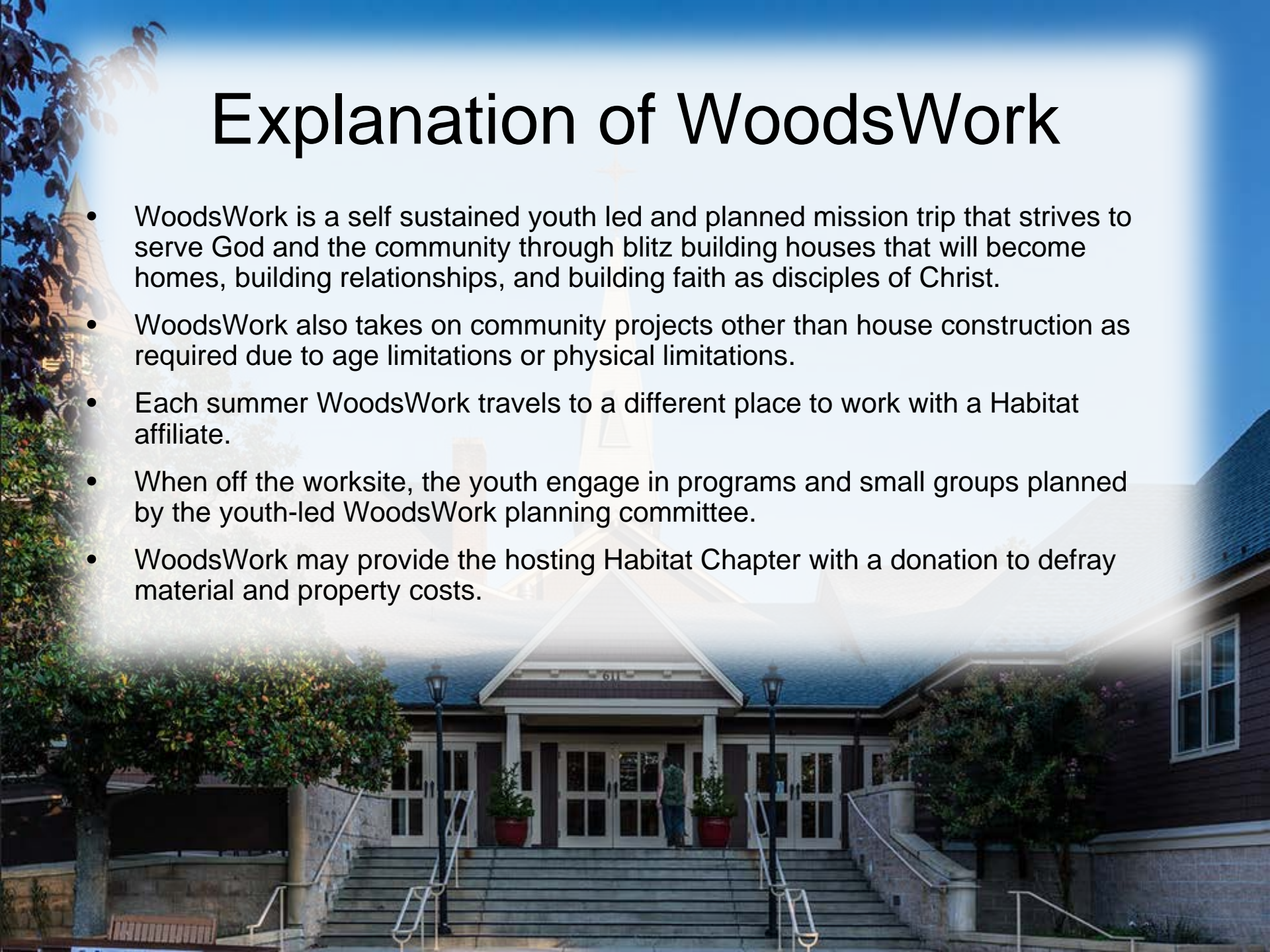

Explanation of WoodsWork

- WoodsWork is a self sustained youth led and planned mission trip that strives to serve God and the community through blitz building houses that will become homes, building relationships, and building faith as disciples of Christ.
- WoodsWork also takes on community projects other than house construction as required due to age limitations or physical limitations.
- Each summer WoodsWork travels to a different place to work with a Habitat affiliate.
- When off the worksite, the youth engage in programs and small groups planned by the youth-led WoodsWork planning committee.
- WoodsWork may provide the hosting Habitat Chapter with a donation to defray material and property costs.

WoodsWork is Unique



- Youth do the majority of the planning and actual construction work for the trip.
- There is a loving atmosphere found in all aspects of the trip.
- There is an emphasis on building faith through nightly programs and small groups, expanding the trip's goal beyond mission.
- The trip leaves a lasting effect on the youth; both in creating friendships and in creating or building upon existing faiths.
- The rate at which 80 - 120 focused high school students with adult supervision can construct houses is remarkable.
- The trip has a positive effect on the community that we visit, both in homes and inspiration.

Our Housing Needs

- **church or school:**
 - Large gym or recreation room where our group will sleep.
 - Large gym, sanctuary, or recreation room where our group will conduct program.
 - Large cafeteria or fellowship hall where our group will conduct meals.
 - Large scale cooking facility with refrigeration and freezer storage
 - Showers (6-8 per gender).
 - Bathrooms.

We Take Care of Ourselves

We provide our own meals, cooking staff, and supplies.



We clean up after ourselves, at home base, and at the work site.



Safety Requirements

- All youth and advisors receive safety instruction and construction training prior to trip.
- Helmets and eye protection provided and required.
- We have access to medical care; nurse or doctor (health-care professional) is on the trip.
- Must be 18+ in order to operate power tools.
- No youth under the age of 16 is permitted on an active worksite.
- Any/all medications are only administered by the trip nurse.



Habitat Responsibilities

Construction:

- Two to three homes to construct.
- Other community rehab projects.
- All building materials.
- School or church to stay.

Faith Development:

- Future owners selected before arrival.
- Future owners participating with the youth while building their homes
- Future owners participating in other events with the youth such as meals and program





Size of our Group (Youth and Adult Advisors)

- 80 - 120 youth
(graduated 8th grade through graduated 12th grade)
- 40 - 60 adult advisors

Required Pre-trip Events

- Orientation 1:

- Introduction to the WoodsWork Committee. Overview of the trips mission and objectives. Review trip theme, dates, destination, and methods of transportation.
- Review schedule for each day/workday including what our construction objectives are.
- Review the structure and roles of Work Groups and Small Groups.
- Introduction to the Habitat Chapter Leadership Team and our points of contact at home base.
- Overview of home base living accommodations including sleeping areas, showers, gym, cafeteria, and program space.
- Peer to peer Q/A with Woodwork Youth Committee. Parent Q/A. Q/A with the trip's Nurse.

- Orientation 2:

- Review fundraising requirements, the trips daily schedule, home base workgroup assignments, activities with your small groups, requirements for carwash, commissioning Sunday, and Pack the Truck.
- Review departure Instructions, Packing List, Liability Forms, and Medical Forms.
- We have three 30-minute stations with specific orientations regarding: wall construction, tools and attire for the worksite, and safety.
- Introduction to Small Groups.
- Review the WoodsWork Covenant. Discuss rules and expectations.
- Q/A with the trip's Nurse.

- Car Wash

- Fundraise money for the trip.
- Introduction to Work Groups.
- Safety Training and Tool Time (practice) for first time WoodsWorkers.
- Child Protection Policy Training for all adult volunteers.

- Pack the Truck

- Departure instructions.
- Trip's Nurse reviews medications with parents (individually) – possession of medications are transferred.

Our Organization Structure

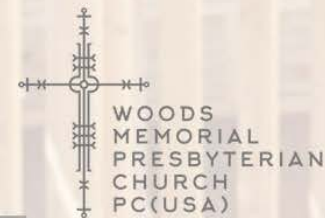
Advisor Skill Levels

“Advisors” on the trip come from all different professions including teachers, nurses, doctors, engineers, psychiatrists, lawyers, architects, accountants, etc. All advisors undergo a background check and formal Child Protection Policy Training.

- **WoodsWork Committee**
 - Team of leaders responsible for planning and leading WoodsWork.
- **Site Lead**
 - Professional architects and experienced builders responsible for materials, schedules, documents, and Work Group assignments. These individuals work with the Habitat Chapter in advance to review construction documents and create panel diagrams.
- **House Captains**
 - Each house has a professional builder and a group of assistant captains that oversee the construction or rehab of the house or project. All have proven leadership and construction capabilities.
- **Advisors**
 - The Advisors are hand-picked, assigned adults who have shown an eagerness to work on site and serve as guides for the youth work groups. Some of the advisors have construction knowledge. All advisors focus on safety.
- **Work Group Leaders**
 - The Work Group Leaders are youth who have been on past WoodsWork trips and have experience on the worksite, have demonstrated leadership qualities, and a positive work ethic.
- **Nurse**
 - Dedicated individual focusing on hydration, sunscreen application, administering all medications, and administering first aid (cuts, scratches, bruises), as necessary.

Work Groups:

- The youth are divided into work groups of 4-5. In total there are roughly 20 Work Groups. They remain a team for all 9 days.
- Each Work Group is assigned a Work Group Leader – a junior or senior who has been on past WoodsWork trips and has experience on the worksite, has demonstrated leadership qualities, and a positive work ethic.
- Each Work Group will have a different adult advisor assigned to them on a daily basis.

Our Organization Structure

Small Groups:

- The youth are divided into groups of 8-10. In total there are roughly 12 Small Groups. They remain a group for all 9 days.
- Each Small Group is assigned a Small Group Leader – a junior or senior who has been on past WoodsWork trips and is comfortable and capable of leading faith-based discussions.
- Each Small Group will have the same 2-3 adult advisors who will remain with them for the entirety of the trip.
- Small Groups meet after program to discuss topics highlighted during evening program. They also will attend church together on Sunday morning and will travel and have dinner together as a group on laundry night.

Decking Construction

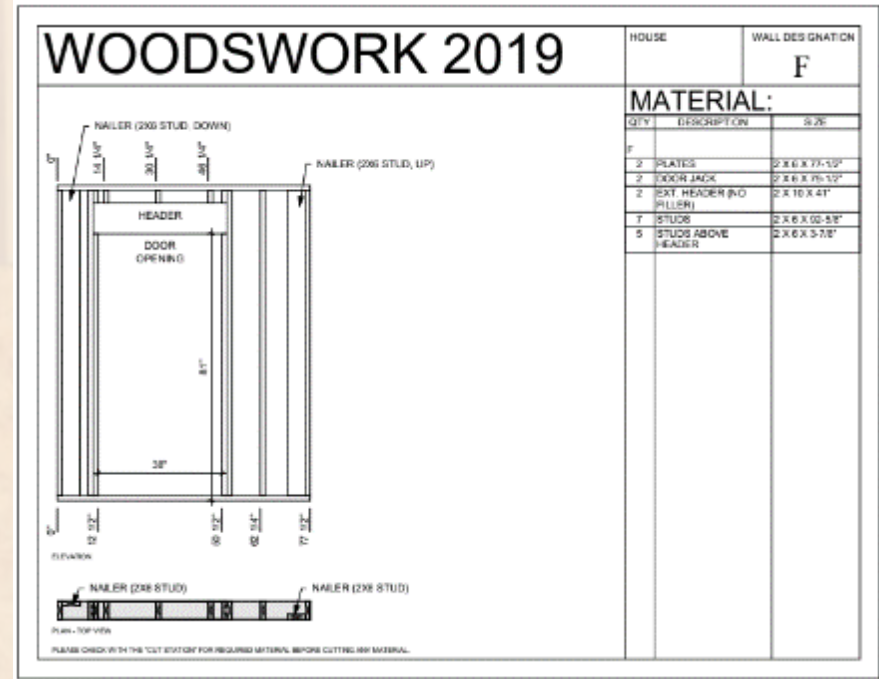
Decking on all houses is typically completed by the end of Work Day 1.

Wall Assembly

"Walls" are constructed as panels separate from the house, not yet raised. Roughly 60-80 panels are constructed daily. Typical houses range between 40 and 60 panels.



Work Progression: Day 2

Exterior Wall Raising

Exterior Walls are sheathed and raised.



Work Progression: Day 2

Interior Wall Raising

The remaining “walls” are constructed, transported, and installed.



Work Progression: Day 3

Roof Construction Begins

Top plate installed and roof trusses are raised. Roof sheathing begins.



Work Progression: Day 4

Weather Proofing

Sheathing, roof paper, house wrap, windows, doors, shingles



Work Progression: Day 4 & 5

Brush With Kindness

Youth under the age of 16 participate in other community rehabilitation projects and offsite construction projects.



Work Progression: Day 5

Siding, shingling, rough electrical, placement of doors, windows, showers, etc.

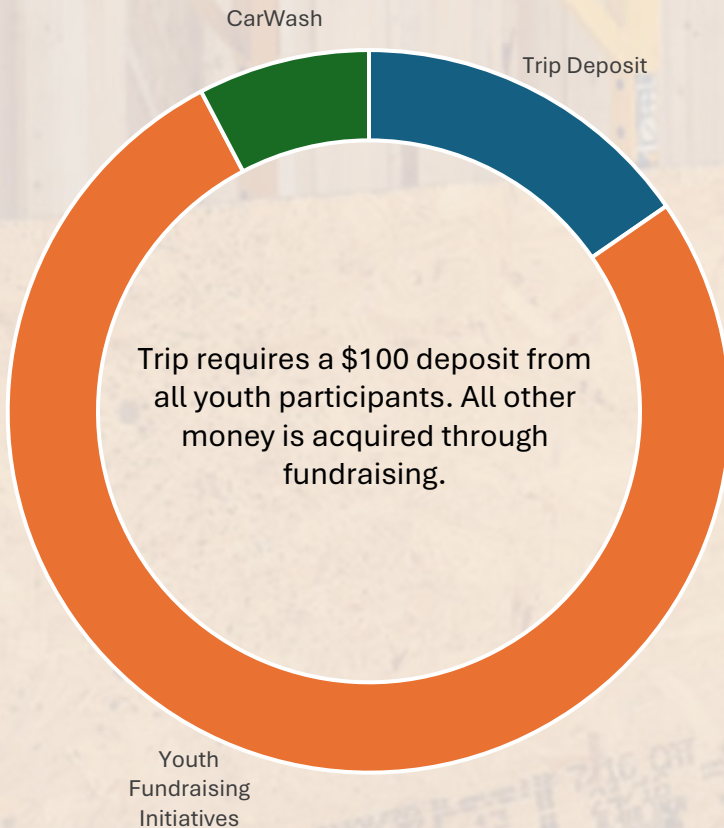

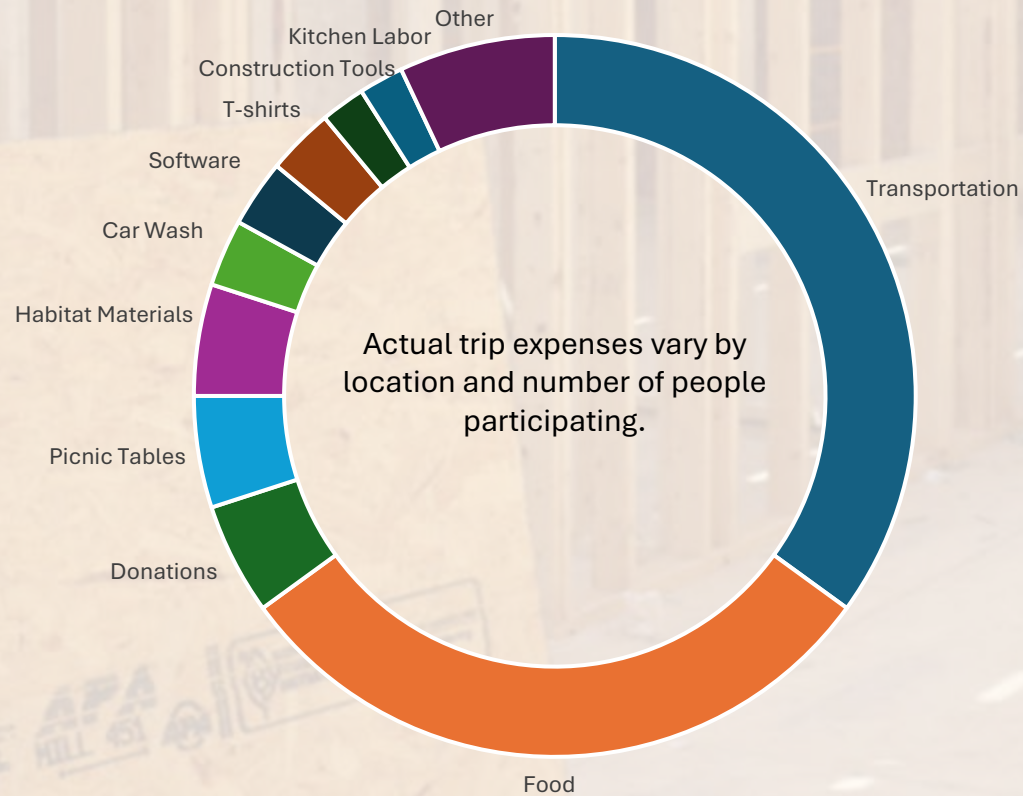

WoodsWork Mission Trip Builds Home And Community

A mother of 10 former foster children in Kittanning, Pennsylvania, will soon have a home tailored to her unique family, thanks in part to a group from Woods Memorial Presbyterian Church in Severna Park.

The WoodsWork mission trip has been a cornerstone of the Woods Church youth ministry for more than three decades. High school students and their adult chaperones — a combination of parents and devoted youth ministry volunteers — partner with Habitat for Humanity to spend a week onsite building a home.

At the end of June, 35 youth and 23 adults traveled to Kittanning to partner with Armstrong Habitat for Humanity. The home they helped construct was an expansive six-bedroom rancher.

"Normally, Habitat has maybe a team of five people who are working on a house for a whole year or two years," said Elizabeth Cahoon, director of youth ministry at Woods Church.



The WoodsWork team from Woods Church helped construct a six-bedroom home in Kittanning, Pennsylvania, this summer. The WoodsWork group included 35 youth and 23 adults.

"In one week, we have as many as 5,000 people hours," said Vic Marone, adult chair of WoodsWork. "We frame a house from foundation up. We do all interior walls, exterior walls, the roof, and do windows and doors. So we can do that in five days, which is kind of impressive when you think about a bunch of youth that have no experience."

Marone further explained that while first-time WoodsWork goers don't have experience, those who return year after year bring their skills from previous missions with them.

One such student is Olivia Blake, a rising senior at Severna Park High School who completed her second WoodsWork mission this year and will serve as next year's youth chair

"It's really good, especially for kids in Severna Park, to get out and see communities other than the one that we live in, and be

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to be terrified of the heights, but one of the advisers encouraged me to try and get up on the roof, and I just crave that feeling. I love being up on the roof. I look forward to it every time."

She and the rest of the WoodsWork committee will get to work soon, as planning starts in September for next summer's trip. A priority for next year is increasing the number of youth involved, and Olivia's recruiting pitch goes deeper than building houses.

"You make some of your closest friends and such amazing connections with the youth and the adults in your community that the connections just last forever," Olivia said. "It's really good, especially for kids in

Severna Park, to get out and see communities other than the one that we live in, and be able to help other people that might not be as fortunate."

This sentiment of the mission being bigger than the house is shared by the adults who help guide the young volunteers.

"We try and do our best to not just come, build a house and leave but really build a connection with the people there," said Cahoon, who had a chance this year to meet the home's future owner, a woman she deemed "a true superhero."

"We sometimes complain about our teenagers, but here is a group of teens that are working very hard, and they're doing it because they want to do it. It's very heartwarming to see that," Marone said.

Registration Is Now Open For Woods Church Mission Trip

For 38 years, Woods Memorial Presbyterian Church has partnered with Habitat for Humanity through a weeklong mission trip, known as WoodsWork, where high school students and adult chaperones build or restore a house for the homeless as well as participate in community-building and faith-related activities.

In 2023, the mission trip will return from June 22 to June 30 in Hartsville, South Carolina.

"Habitat's mission is to build homes for people who have a hard time purchasing their first home ... we help them by kind of accelerating the process," said Elizabeth Cahoon, Woods Church director of youth ministry.

While it often takes Habitat for Humanity several months or years to build a home with a limited number of volunteers, the WoodsWork mission trip com-

pacts the process into just one week, leaving behind a completed house frame.

Youth chair Olivia Blake said not only does the family receive a house they can make into a home, but many of the families also help the team build the house.

"This experience provides them with amazing memories and helps them connect with the house more deeply," Blake said.

Blake, a Severna Park High School senior, has been a part of the WoodsWork mission trip and planning committee for the past two years and is the chair of the committee for her third year of WoodsWork.

Another Severna Park senior, Ryan Kohler, is looking forward to her second year of WoodsWork after a great first experience.

"I just thought it would be a really rewarding experience, which it was," Kohler said. "I didn't even know most of the people when I went on the trip, [but] we were still able to come together and make a house in a week."

The mission trip also offers other opportunities for participants, including daily programs, discussions of faith

and recreational activities.

Cahoon said WoodsWork is a faith-centered mission trip in the Christian faith, but she added that the trip is welcoming to students of all religious backgrounds.

"Somehow, maybe it's God's grace, I don't know, everyone just feels welcome," Cahoon said. "I think it's a testament to having youth lead it."

The WoodsWork committee, made up of 13 students and six adults, has been meeting over the past couple of months to prepare for the summer trip, which Cahoon calls "a beacon of hope" in the community.

"When the week is over, we all feel like we are part of one big family," said Blake, who hopes to encourage more students to sign up this year. "The people you meet on Woodswork are truly lifelong friends."

Woods Church will host two orientations and a car-wash fundraiser for the

trip in the coming months. This year, Woods Church plans to offer new workshops to assist youth in fundraising for their individual trip payment.

"They all bond with each other, and kids from different schools become very trusting of each other," said Vic Marone, head advisor of WoodsWork. "Seeing youth grow in a week's time is a very gratifying thing for me — that is where I get my joy."

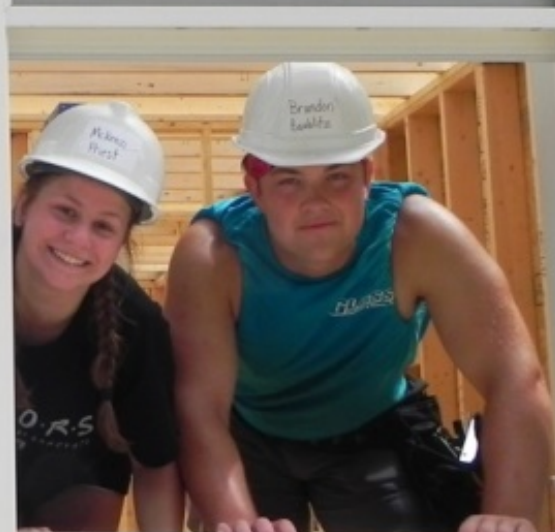
