

New (Non)Ivory to Tickle!

Thank you so much to those who have donated or pledged towards our new grand piano. Along with many students in our neighborhood, it was moved in Tuesday, August 19. The tuner will return the first week of September after the piano acclimates to our sanctuary's temperature and humidity. We donated our previous piano to the Ohio University School of Music for students to practice tuning - a win all the way around.

We are thankful to George Weckman, who had donated our previous piano, and to all of you who are helping to cover the costs of our new grand piano. It cost \$24,503. As of August 26 we have received \$9,720 in donations and an additional \$6,105 in pledges, for a difference of \$8,678. Thank you!

Interestingly, our previous piano was about 100 years old and probably had ivory keys. Our new piano was built in 2019, and was not made with ivory keys, which were phased out in the 1950s due to wildlife preservation concerns.

What is the CROP Hunger Walk?

One in nine people worldwide lack access to clean water and a healthy diet. We walk to show solidarity and to bring awareness while raising funds for permanent change. From its birth in 1969, CWS sponsored CROP Hunger Walks have grown to include walkers of all ages, faiths and backgrounds in more than 500 communities throughout the U.S.

The CROP Hunger Walk is the only nationwide Walk that addresses hunger both locally and globally.

ELCA NEW PRESIDING BISHOP



The Rev. Yehiel Curry was elected as the next presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) at the ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Phoenix, Ariz., on July 30, 2025. He will begin this role on Oct. 1, 2025, and be installed on Oct. 4 in Minneapolis.

Currently, he serves as bishop of the ELCA Metropolitan Chicago Synod, where he leads a synod staff and 160 congregations by providing pastoral care, preaching, teaching, administering sacraments, and overseeing ordinations and installations. He was elected synod bishop in 2019 and reelected in spring 2025. Curry chaired the ELCA Conference of Bishops, fostering ecumenical relationships and theological engagement across the Lutheran communion.

Previously, Curry served as the mission developer (2007–2012) and pastor (2013–2019) of Shekinah Chapel Lutheran Church in Riverdale, Ill. He earned a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, Ill., and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. He and his wife, LaShonda, are the proud parents of three daughters.



For many years, the Social Ministry Committee at Christ Lutheran Church has provided underwear and sweats for Athens County school children. At first, the Committee collected donations of underwear and sweats and then distributed them to Athens County Schools. The last few years, the process has been streamlined by collecting donations from congregation members and then giving the money to Athens County Children Services, whose School Outreach Workers purchase and distribute underwear, sweats, and other supplies to students who have a need for them through the year. Christ Lutheran Evangelical Church 2025 Impact Fund Grants



ATHENS PHOTO PROJECT 1. A \$10,800.00 grant was approved for the Athens Photographic Project for their Collaborative Recovery Project with NAMI and SEO Hope Center. Athens Photo Project (APP) is a Peer Run Organization that promotes mental health recovery support and social engagement in SE Ohio. They provide photography classes, exhibition opportunities, and workforce development programs free of charge for community members affected by mental health and/or substance abuse disorders. APP is purchasing and renovating a new building just a block away from their current space on W. Union St. They have received over \$400,000 in state, county, and foundation funds for this building. Our Impact Fund award will help APP partner with NAMI and SEO Hope Center, so they can also move into the new Blue Line Dr. building and pay the first-year rental costs and utilities, while they develop sustainable service income for their future rent and operations.





2. An **\$8,600** grant is going to The Gathering Place for their Improving Accessibility Project. Their beautiful 3-story Victorian house located on Congress St. is currently not handicap accessible, and their members wanted to find inexpensive solutions to improving access to the services. They plan to purchase a chair lift that will be attached to the back stairs, which will allow those with limited mobility to access the offices and programs on the second floor. This will allow The Gathering Place to serve more clients and to continue to serve their current and long-time members.



- 3. A \$10,000 award was approved for the Survivor Advocacy Outreach Program for their Expanding Emergency Needs Support for Survivors in Southeast Ohio Project. SAOP provides trauma-informed services and empowers survivors to safely leave abusive situations and begin healing. Prepaid gas and grocery cards are essential to allow survivors to attend court, medical appointments, and travel to shelter. Also, TracFones and prepaid minutes help survivors communicate safely when their phones are inaccessible or compromised. Emergency clothing is necessary for those who experience violence and arrive at hospitals without adequate clothing. Personal safety devices, including doorbell cameras, enhance home safety and give peace of mind after they flee a dangerous situation. This grant will allow SAOP to provide emergency assistance to a minimum of 75 survivors over the next year.
- **4.** A **\$5,000** tithe will be sent to the ELCA Global Missions for a project designated by the Social Ministry Committee.
- **5.** This **totals \$34,400** worth of grants approved at the July Council meeting.

SEPTEMBER 2025 Wave of Prayer

On August 3, Russia and Ukraine agreed to release 1,200 prisoners of war. This follows a prisoner exchange in May when each side released 1000 prisoners, the largest prisoner swap since Russia's war against Ukraine began three and a half years ago in February 2022. However, attacks continue, and an end to the conflict seems uncertain.

God, we thank you for the release of both Ukrainian and Russian prisoners. We thank you for the reunification of family and loved ones. May current talks and negotiations be effective so that this war may finally come to an end. Loving God, we offer you our prayer.

Four years ago, the Taliban took control in Afghanistan and subsequently limited the education of girls. Fortunately, a foundation named after Linda Norgrove, a young Scottish woman killed in Afghanistan in 2010, was established to help provide access to some form of education for all girls in Afghanistan, including those from nomadic families, those in remote areas, and those with visual impairments. In addition, 19 young Afghani women who were unable to continue their medical schooling in Afghanistan are currently studying medicine in Scotland, thanks to the initiative and support of the foundation.

God, we thank you for Linda Norgrove's parents, who turned their grief into good, establishing a program to support Afghani girls and women living in tragic circumstances. Thank you for their belief that gender should not be a barrier to education. Inspire us to do what we can to help others near or far, as the Norgroves are doing. Loving God, we offer you our prayer.

More than one million immigrants in the U.S. work in health care—as caregivers, maintenance staff, and housekeepers. Over 7 percent of all people working in long-term care facilities are non-citizens, many who have built deep relationships with the residents they serve. On June 27, the government announced an impending end to Temporary Protected Status (TPS), which since 1990 has been granted to people from countries considered unsafe. TPS protects against deportation and allows for work permits. There are currently one million TPS holders from more than 12 countries who now face an uncertain future.

God, we pray for all immigrants in the United States whose future is unknown. May they have the support needed to face what may come. We also pray for health care facilities which will be negatively impacted if non-citizen workers are deported. May these facilities have enough staff to care for those who need care. Loving God, we offer you our prayer.

80 years ago, on August 6 and 9, the U.S. dropped atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in Japan, killing around 170,000 people instantly. Those who survived have faced long-lasting effects and are still dying today from radiation-induced cancers. In addition, survivors have faced discrimination and psychological damage such as depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. Despite the UN Secretary General's appeal for the total elimination of nuclear weapons, at least nine countries possess them.

God, we pray for all Japanese people who were impacted by the atomic bombings eight decades ago—those who lost their families and those who lost their well-being. We pray that there may never again be such a devastating nuclear attack in our world. May countries build arsenals of peace rather than arsenals of arms. May we, like Sadako Sasaki, the atomic bomb victim who folded 644 paper cranes before leukemia took her life at age 12, keep wishing for, hoping for, praying for, and believing in peace. Loving God, we offer you our prayer.
